Assessment task/component	Description
Attendance (20 marks)	Students are expected to be present in the NGO meetings and will be a major component for the final evaluation of the course. Proof of their attendance duly signed by the NGO authority is to be submitted with the Final Report.

SEWA Report Video (40 marks)	<p><b>It will be a group task where each student has to contribute to preparing a detailed video of a minimum of 10-15 Minutes of all the activities and duties which they have carried out during the SEWA program.</b></p> <p>The video should not be less than 10-15 minutes and should include a detailed analysis of the NGO along with the duties performed by the student. Students should also mention the challenges and learnings from the internship in the video. This video shall be submitted to the faculty mentor concerned for evaluation purposes.</p>

#### 6. SESSION PLAN

Each student will choose an NGO mentioned in the Annexure attached with the course plan. Within their respective study groups, the students will approach the NGOs for SEWA. 4 hours on each Saturday is

dedicated to the SEWA Program in the timetable and the students have to liaison with the respective NGO for services every Saturday in the slot mentioned in the time-table. Every student has to complete the 40 SEWA Hours and has to submit all the assessments with proof and attendance at the end of the trimester.
